Alumni profile	<p>The alumni acquire a general knowledge of security studies and social science with special reference to international security issues such as: international organizations, geopolitics, disputes and military conflicts, international security threats, security strategies of international organizations, organizations, agencies and institutions for global and regional security. The alumni acquire a general knowledge and expertise in international security including socio-political issues. They are familiar with functioning of the major international organizations for security and the role these organizations play in shaping the contemporary system of political relations. They are also competent in matters relating to military, demographic, energy and economic threats on the regional and global levels.</p> <p>The graduates of <i>International Security</i> are prepared for the effective social and political communication, finding creative solutions of analytical problems of international security, being an active participant in international security projects, managing and work in interdisciplinary teams, preparing logical and factual cause-and-effect analysis of socio-political processes related to international security, estimating the role of the state in the international security environment. They are qualified to participate actively in national and international projects on security (military, economic, demographic, cultural) to estimate, analyze and forecast international security situations.</p> <p>Moreover, the graduates of <i>International Security</i> have and use practically a knowledge about political events, social processes, dependencies between international security situations, analyze phenomena of international relations focusing especially on their importance for security, promote patriotism as a moral value, follow the code of conduct and work for a social good; predict social risks threatening international security including public sector (politics) as well as private sector (corporations, lobbying).</p>
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	<p>The graduates of <i>International Security</i> major acquire basic research skills to forecast creatively new threats and socio-political problems in international environment. They are desired specialists in developing international strategies for public and private sectors, making priority decisions on development of trans-sectoral relations and cooperation for international security. The graduates are prepared to apply knowledge and skills gained while studying to define quality of threats and problems; will be able to write correctly outlined, accurate and factual analysis/expertise; gain skills to make independent research initiatives on international security as well as skills to prioritize actions.</p>
Competencies and vocational training qualifications	<p>The graduates reach C1 level of English as per the <i>Common European Framework of Reference for Languages</i> (CEFR) and at least A2 level of the second foreign language as per the <i>Common European Framework of Reference for Languages</i> (CEFR).</p> <p>The graduates can be employed as international security specialists, analysts, process analysts, data analysts, international relations specialists, Business Process Management specialists, public administration workers (civil servants), workers for international organizations and institutions, and private sector organizations for international security. Their analytical skills will be an advantage on the labor market related to data processing and services whereas political, military and intelligence profile of the studies prepares them to work for Intelligence services. <i>International Security Major</i> prepares specialists to work in international institutions, public administration, ministry of foreign affairs, ministry of internal affairs, ministry of national defense, non-governmental organizations and agencies for international cooperation of armed forces, police, border guards, special forces, civil protection services, and private agencies providing security services for business and individuals.</p>
